- We will mail pick-up information in February, 2008. Please list address above that you receive mail from at that time. Mail check for the exact amount, including Sales Tax.
- Terms: P=(Plug): seedling grown in a plastic tube for 1 year, P-1: a 2 yr. old plant, grown 1 yr as a plug and 1 yr in the field, 2-0: a 2 yr. old plant grown in the field.
- All plants are bare root seedlings unless otherwise noted. Orders are on a first come, first served basis.

Warning! Any order not picked up at the delivery site on the appointed pick-up day will be donated to conservation projects.

The Pacific Conservation District (PCD) promotes sound, volunteer conservation programs and can provide financial and technical assistance to foster a healthy relationship between people and the environment. The PCD values its relationship with its partners and cooperators and serves as a locally led, locally driven entity to serve its constituents within Pacific County while benefiting the environment with educated and common sense alternatives.

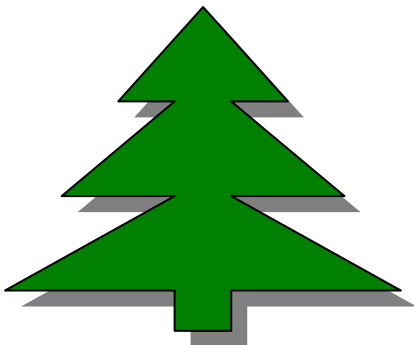
The PCD has been serving local citizens since our inception on May 25, 1949. Timber, dairy, beef, fish, cranberries, and shellfish account for an overwhelming proportion of the local economy. There are 1,323 stream and estuary near shore miles within PCD boundaries, nearly all of which drain into Willapa Bay. These areas are utilized to some extent by one or all of the five native salmon species: Coho, Chinook, Chum Salmon; Steelhead and Coastal Cutthroat Trout. The Willapa Bay estuary consists of 88,000 acres and 188 miles of near shore habitat. Over 85 percent of the geographic landscape within Pacific county is managed for timber. The Grayland and Long Beach areas support cranberry production that is a unique industry within Washington State.

The PCD has provided financial technical and educational assistance to private landowners, small forest landowners, dairy, beef, fish, cranberries, and shellfish producers with their resource concerns

If you are a landowner that may need technical, financial or educational assistance with any of the above listed natural resources, please give us a call too see if we can be of assistance. There are many programs available that may address your resource concerns. Again the PCD is a non-regulatory, volunteer based group that is here to assist you in your operation. The Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) is a joint partnership between

the State of Washington and USDA, and is administered by the Washington State Conservation Commission and the Farm Services Agency (FSA). The agreement was signed in 1998 and provides incentives to restore and improve salmon and steelhead habitat on private land. Conservation Districts across the State, like the PCD, are working with landowners to enroll their agriculture land.

The program is voluntary for landowners. Land enrolled in CREP is removed from production and grazing under 10 or 15 year contracts, and landowners plant trees and shrubs to stabilize the stream bank. These plantings also provide a number of additional ecological functions. In return, landowners receive annual rent, incentive and maintenance payments and cost share for practice installations. These payments made by FSA and the Conservation Commission may result in no cost to the landowner for installation of qualified practices.

Minimum buffer widths have recently been reduced from 180 down to to 35 feet.
